VILLA Bito Nagi

An art-centric villa in a village depicted by popular ninja-themed manga “Naruto”.

Located in northeastern Okayama Prefecture, Nagi is a town still filled with beautiful, natural Japanese landscapes. Also the hometown of Masashi Kishimoto—the creator of famed ninja manga “Naruto”—Nagi served as the real-life inspiration for the world of “Naruto.” VILLA Bito Nagi is a luxury villa in this town where guests can spend time immersed in both the world of “Naruto” and an impressive array of artworks.

Nagi is also an art town. Nagi even has an art museum that was created experimentally as a world first, the Nagi-cho Museum of Contemporary Art. Also known as Nagi MOCA, this art museum was built to showcase and integrate three enormous works commissioned from three teams of artists. The museum was designed by Pritzker Prize-winning architect, Arata Isozaki. The three featured artists are Shusaku Arakawa and his partner and wife, poet Madeline Gins, sculptor Kazuo Okazaki, and sculptor Aiko Miyawaki. The art museum comprises three buildings—sun, moon and earth—and enormous artworks were built to form the art museum itself.

Inspired by the Nagi-cho Museum of Contemporary Art, VILLA Bito Nagi was conceived as an art museum where guests could stay overnight. The innovative exterior design evokes the famous shuriken from “Naruto” and was designed by architect Noritsugu Sasamori. The building’s exterior was painted by roller-painter Takeshi Sato. Inside the villa, works from sculptor Taro Kitagawa are displayed along with paintings (replicas) from Le Corbusier, one of the three greatest architects in history. Every volume of the complete “Naruto” manga (in Japanese) is available here, as well as a

book introducing the complete works of Le Corbusier. Accommodating up to nine people, this villa is the perfect place for family and friends to unwind and relax. Guests can even bring their own ingredients to prepare meals at the on-site kitchen. There is also a nearby cafe serving breakfast, as well as a local store that has been in business for over a century.

With over 1,300 years of history and culture, Nagi is home to direct descendants of the famed scholar Sugawara Michizane, revered as Japan’s deity of learning. It is also a sacred place where Honen, the Buddhist priest and founder of Pure Land Buddhism in Japan, first studied Buddhism.

Located at the foot of Mt. Nagi, the highest peak in Okayama Prefecture, VILLA Bito Nagi is a place surrounded by nature where the vast starry sky shines overhead like scattered sparkling gemstones at night.
